

From the 8-10th December, I spent my weekend up at Trentham Military Camp, for the NZDF/CF Innovation of the Year competition. Saturday was the big day, with


presentations from Defense Excellence as well as the Joint Defence Service Innovation Team. They talked about how they can make anything
